Stacie Crocetti is a graduate of Boston University with a BS in Environmental Science and a minor in Geology. In recent years, she has focused on leadership skills, women's studies and advancing ecotourism in Maine. She is a certified Wilderness First Responder. Stacie also sits on the Maine Stewards Program panel where she promotes the value of ecotourism and the importance of Maine's creative economy. She has co-owned Hardy Boat Cruises for 28 years. Stacie's leadership has seen the ferry service adopt an ethos of education: informing passengers on key ecological, historical, and biological issues in Muscongus Bay and on Monhegan. Countless school districts across New England partner with Hardy Boat Cruises for educational trips. Her direction has earned the ferry service numerous awards including The Gulf Of Maine Council on The Marine Environment's ~ Gulf of Maine Visionary Award, Down East Magazine's ~ Best Of Maine and the 2020 Governor's Award For Tourism Excellence. Stacie is a metalsmith, fiber artist and world traveler. Stacie and her husband Al have two sons. Sebastian and Teo, and live in Bremen, Maine.

Susan Danly is currently an independent curator of American Art. Susan has worked in museums across the country over the past thirty years – from the Huntington Library and Art Galleries in California, to the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts in Philadelphia, the Mead Art Museum at Amherst College, and the Portland Museum of Art. A specialist in the history of American photography, she has authored numerous books and catalogues, most recently a history of photography in Maine, along with Libby Bischof and the Maine State Historian, Earle G.
